

Woody's latest romantic New York comedy revolves around the ebb and flow of a specific marriage. The title, taken from the Greek goddess of love, firmly roots the story in mythology with Woody's wry re-invention of the traditional Greek chorus providing commentary on the foibles of the lovers whose attachments and dream are the focus of the story. 21,22,25 Sept. Dir: Margarethe Von Trotta, Germany, 1994, 119mins. Across nearly three decades of political turmoil Von Trotta chronicles the life and times of divided Berlin through the perspective of two lovers - Sophie in the West and Konrad in the East. Separated in 1961, they see each other only 3 times in 30 years. The power of love and alienation rail against the force of circumstance. 26,27,28,29 Sept.






